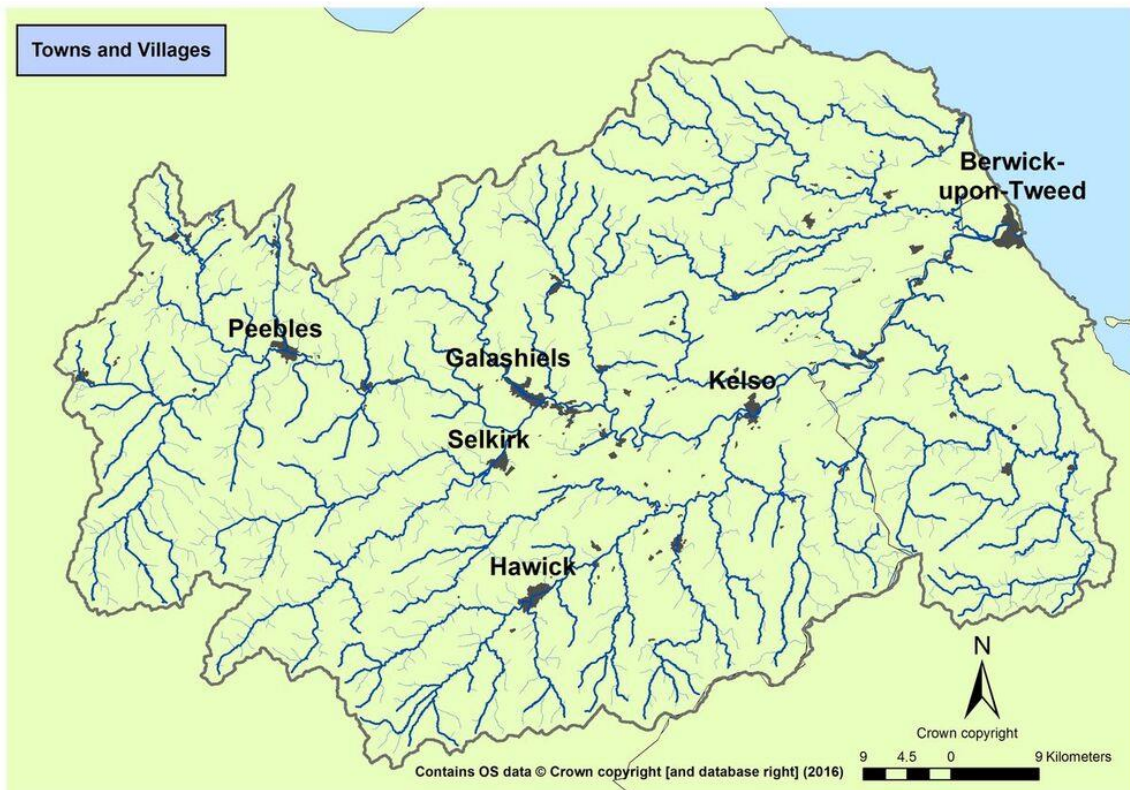




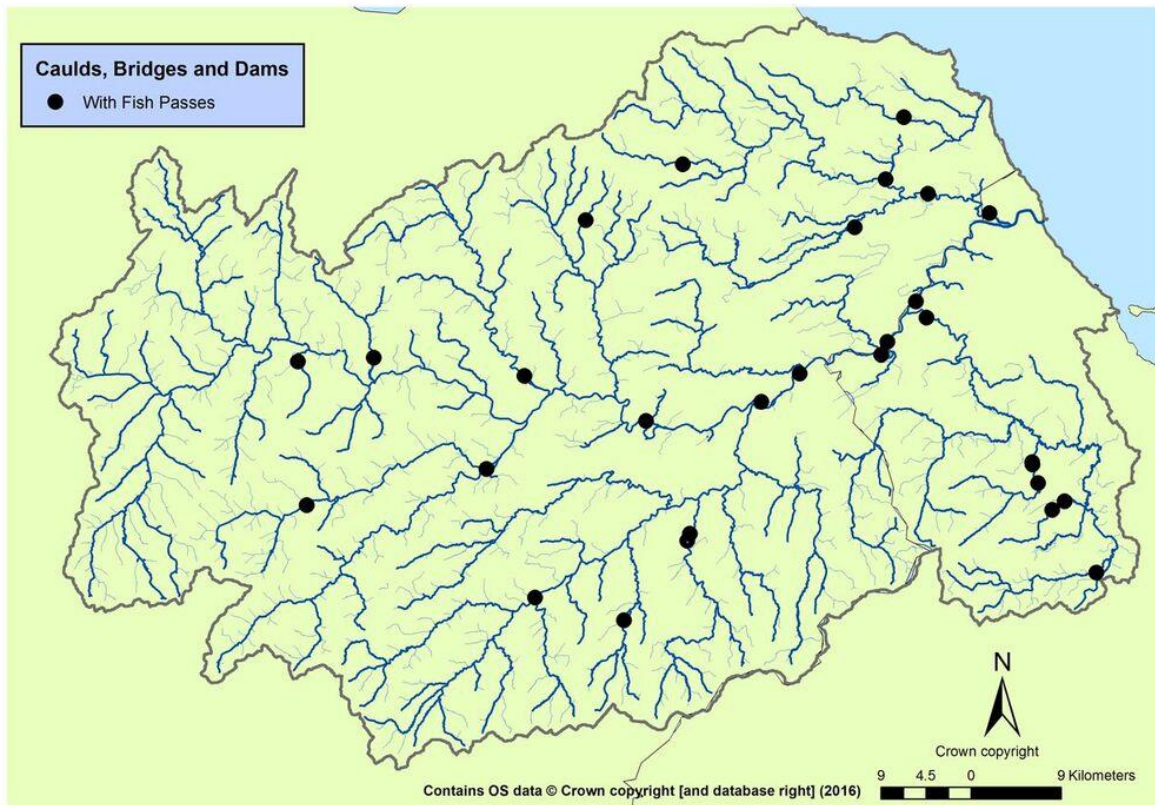
## Towns on the River Tweed



The map shows towns on the River Tweed. Peebles, Galashiels, Selkirk, Hawick, Kelso and Berwick upon Tweed all sit along the river. Peebles is an ancient market town that grew in prosperity when the railway to Edinburgh arrived. Galashiels' name comes from the word shiel, which means dwelling and Gala from the Gala Water. Selkirk is one of the oldest border towns, its population grew, like Galashiels and Hawick with the production of woollen textiles from the mills on the banks of the Tweed. Kelso came into existence as a direct result of the Abbey and the town grew up around it. At one time there was a ferry crossing the Tweed at Kelso. Berwick upon Tweed is where the Tweed meets the sea and is the most northern town in England. Berwick has 'belonged' to both England and Scotland over the years. The Tweed forms part of the border between the two countries.



## Man Made Structures on the Tweed



This map shows the Tweed catchment. You can see the main rivers and tributaries of the Tweed river system. The black dots show the caulds, bridges and dams that have fish passes. Fish passes help migrating fish such as Salmon to travel up the river to their spawning grounds.
